SUBJECT: Learning Site Business Case

SUMMARY: A business case has been prepared for consideration by the PCC in respect of purchasing or leasing an additional site to develop a centre of learning for Norfolk Constabulary.

One of the impacts of austerity has been that Norfolk Constabulary significantly rationalised and downsized their estate requirements. Over time, this has resulted in the OCC campus being put under strain from an accommodation perspective. The demands on the site have recently been increased due to the collaboration with Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service occupying former constabulary offices.

In addition, the implementation of the Police Education Qualification Framework (PEQF) means that new recruits will learn in a different way and will need improved facilities and spaces in which to learn.

Finally, with the government's Uplift programme, the forecast number of recruits for Norfolk Constabulary is in excess of 600 over four years (for officers alone). The current OCC campus is 2,298 m2 short of capacity and another option is required as soon as possible.

A business case was commissioned by the Chief Constable, for presentation to the PCC, to review options for addressing this capacity challenge, and developing a new improved vision for learning for the constabulary with the potential for the involvement of other public sector partners.

5 options were reviewed:

- 1. Expanding on the current site
- 2. A new build
- 3. Any other freehold or leasehold options
- 4. Hethersett Old Hall School
- 5. RAF Barnham

The business case reviewed each option against a set of evaluation criteria. The clear recommendation is that Hethersett Old School Hall has the strongest case, and that the site should be approved for purchase. The business case was independently reviewed by the Chartered Surveyors, Bidwells who supported the recommendation as outlined.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the PCC approves the purchase of Hethersett Old Hall School for £3,352,500, in accordance with the business case. This site will then be developed into a Norfolk Constabulary Centre of Learning, with the potential for significant collaboration with and investment from other public sector partners.

KEY ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION:

1. OVERVIEW:

- 1.1 A business case has been prepared for consideration by the PCC in respect of purchasing or leasing an additional site to develop a centre of learning.
- 1.2 The full business case accompanies this decision notice, along with the Equality Impact Assessment.

- Hethersett Old Hall School
- RAF Barnham
- 1.8 The business case reviewed each option against a set of evaluation criteria. The clear recommendation is that Hethersett Old School Hall has the strongest case, and that the site should be approved for purchase.

2. STRATEGIC AIMS/OBJECTIVE SUPPORTED:

- 2.1 As outlined in the Business Case (para 2.13) a new centre of learning supports the PCC's Police and Crime Plan 2016-2020 strategic objectives to:
 - Increase visible policing
 - Support rural communities
 - Deliver a modern and innovative service

3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

- 3.1 These are set out in full in the Business Case and the appendices to that document.
- 3.2 The funding assumptions for the purchase are considered in the business case and outlined here. The recent PFI refinancing gain achieved through the PCCs approach to Good Stewardship of Taxpayers money (£2.8m), and generated from a review of the Estate, will be used in full as a contribution to the capital purchase of the site. In addition, there will be a contribution by way of a capital receipt of the former Headmaster's House (£0.450m). Any spend over that value is currently assumed to be subject to external borrowing, incurring Minimum Revenue Provision (MRP) and interest charges, both funded by the increase in core grant in respect of Operation Uplift. No funding is assumed from local taxpayers through an increase in the precept.
