Norfolk Youth Commission on Police and Crime: Application Notes

Please read carefully before filling in your application form.

1. What is the Youth Commission on Police and Crime?

The Youth Commission allows young people to get involved and have their say about policing and crime where they live.

The Norfolk Youth Commission enables young people to support, challenge and inform the work of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Norfolk, Lorne Green. This is a very important role, because it helps the Commissioner to make decisions to meet the needs of young people.

2. Who can join the Norfolk Youth Commission?

This year we are looking for participants aged 14-25 years from **the Norfolk policing area** –including Norwich, South Norfolk, Great Yarmouth, Broadland, North Norfolk, King's Lynn and West Norfolk, and Breckland. This role is open to anyone in this age group from one of these areas.

In total, we are seeking to recruit 30 young people. We are looking for people who are team players and willing to get involved with all the activities of the Youth Commission. We are also very keen to ensure that the Youth Commission is made up of a diverse group of young people who broadly reflect the make-up of the local population, including those who may have direct personal experience of the police and the criminal justice system.

3. If I join, what will I have to do?

Between May 2017 and December 2017, members of the Youth Commission will:

Take part in Youth Commission meetings: You will participate in 5 Youth
 Commission meetings. (May, July, September, November and December). At

these events, the members of the Youth Commission will come together to discuss and set objectives for the project. In these meetings you will develop skills and come up with creative ideas for workshops. You will also reflect and review the progress of the project.

- Work on special topics: You will pick a topic (from a shortlist of relevant topics) that interests you to work on with a small group of other members.
 This may include topics such as: anti-social behaviour, dangerous driving, domestic violence, drug and alcohol abuse, reducing offending and reoffending among young people, and the relationship between young people and the police.
- Gather the views of other young people: You will be given support to carry out peer research with other young people in schools, colleges, universities and youth groups. Peer research means that young people are involved in carrying out research with other young people. As a peer researcher you will help with developing the questions for the research, carrying out interviews with young people, and feeding back the results of the research. As a rough guide, we would expect each member to carry out 20-30 hours of peer research during the project.
- Plan consultation events: You will work in a team to design and plan consultation events to engage other young people in conversations about your special topics.
- Report back to the Police and Crime Commissioner and Norfolk Police: You
 will contribute towards the analysis of information gathered from young
 people in your area, and help to present back your conclusions to the Police
 and Crime Commissioner and Norfolk Police.
- Help to host the Youth Commission Conference at the end of the year: You
 will have the opportunity to present the Youth Commission's results and
 recommendations at the Norfolk Youth Commission conference and be a part
 of discussions with the police, professionals and other young people.

4. What will I get from being part of the Youth Commission?

• **Discuss issues with decision-makers:** You will meet the Police & Crime Commissioner, officials from Norfolk Constabulary and other partner agencies at Youth Commission events and help them to understand what young people in your area think about police and crime.

- Develop your skills and experience: You will gain valuable skills and experience, which you will be able to use for your CV or applications to Further or Higher Education.
- **Become ambassadors for other young people:** You will give a voice to young people in your area by helping them to get their views heard.
- Meet new people: You will meet a diverse range of other young people from the Norfolk region, and work alongside professionals from different organisations.

5. How do I apply?

- Section 1: If you are under 18, you must also fill out the section regarding your Parent /Guardian /Carer. All Youth Commission members under the age of 18 will be asked to bring along a signed consent form to the first event.
- Section 4: Please complete the self-declaration statement and tell us about
 your personal experience of the police, criminal justice system or other
 experiences that may be relevant. Have you experienced anti-social
 behaviour? Have you had experience with the police? Have you been
 arrested or convicted of a crime? Have you been a witness or a victim of
 crime? We welcome applications from people with all these life experiences.

6. What happens next?

- After the deadline, we will carry out telephone interviews with shortlisted applicants.
- Please note: If you are not successful on this occasion, there are still a number of ways for you to get involved with the Norfolk Youth Commission on Police and Crime and the work of the Police and Crime Commissioner. You can get involved and have your say during the Youth Commission's 'Big Conversation' with young people across Norfolk. Once the Big Conversation launches in November, there will be a variety of ways to give your views, both online and face-to-face. You may want to invite the Youth Commission to come to your school, college or youth group to run a consultation event
